

Domestic Passport Services

Issue Passports to U.S. Citizens!

- In FY 2023, issued over 24 million U.S. passports
- That same FY, there were over 160 million valid U.S. passports in circulation nearly half of all U.S. citizens have passports.

TIP: Check Passport Validity! Renew Early!

- Some countries require passports be valid 6 months beyond trip
- Apply early: 6 months before planned trip

Passport Book or Card?

- Book: for international air travel
- Card: for land/sea travel to/from Canada, Mexico, Bermuda, and Caribbean countries



Travel Advisory Levels 1-4

Exercise normal precautions

Lowest risk. There is some risk in any international travel.

2 Exercise increased caution

Heightened risks to safety and security

Reconsider travel

Reconsider travel due to serious risks to safety and security.

4. Do not travel

Highest advisory level: Greater likelihood of life-threatening risks. USG may have very limited ability to provide aid. DOS advises U.S. citizens to not travel or leave as soon as it is safe to do so.



Travel Advisory Risk Indicators

- **C Crime:** Widespread violent/organized crime is present. Local law enforcement may have limited ability to respond.
- **T Terrorism:** Terrorist attacks have occurred and/or specific threats may exist.
- **U Civil Unrest:** Political, economic, religious, and/or ethnic instability may cause violence, major disruptions, and/or safety risks.
- **H Health:** Health risks, including current outbreaks or a crisis that disrupts medical infrastructure, are present.
- **N Natural Disaster:** A natural disaster or its aftermath poses danger.

- **E Time-limited Event:** Short-term event may pose safety risks.
- K Kidnapping or Hostage
 Taking: Criminals or terrorists have threatened to and/or have seized or detained and threatened individuals to compel a third party (including a govt) to do or abstain from doing something as a condition of release.
- **D Wrongful Detention:** The risk of wrongful detention exists
- **O Other:** Covers potential risks not covered by previous risk indicators.



Crisis Management - What We Can and Can't Do

The best time to leave a country is before a crisis, if possible



- ✓ Advise U.S. citizens to leave if it is safe to do so or to shelter in place
- ✔ Provide information on evacuation routes and commercial transportation
- ✔ Provide loans to facilitate repatriation or evacuation



- Pay for evacuations
- Provide transportation within a country to individuals or groups
- Guarantee evacuations





Personal Emergencies – What We Can and Can't Do



- ✓ Visit detained U.S. citizens to ensure receipt of medical care; contact approved POCs; provide info on attorneys, legal processes, etc.
- ✔ Provide repatriation loans; facilitate \$ transfer
- Contact local authorities and institutions to try to locate missing persons
- ✓ Help address emergency needs of crime victims



- Get U.S. citizens out of jail
- Provide legal advice
- Investigate crimes against U.S. citizens
- Pay legal, medical, or other fees
- Provide private information about an U.S. citizen to anyone (e.g. family, friends, members of Congress) without their written consent

Reissued after periodic review with general security updates, and the removal of obsolete COVID-19 page links.

Country Summary: Violent crime – such as homicide, kidnapping, carjacking, and robbery – is widespread and common in Mexico. The U.S. government has limited ability to provide emergency services to U.S. citizens in many areas of Mexico, as travel by U.S. government employees to certain areas is prohibited or restricted. In many states, local emergency services are limited outside the state capital or major cities.

U.S. citizens are advised to adhere to restrictions on U.S. government employee travel. State-specific restrictions are included in the individual state advisories below. U.S. government employees may not travel between cities after dark, may not hail taxis on the street, and must rely on dispatched vehicles, including app-based services like Uber, and regulated taxi stands. U.S. government employees should avoid traveling alone, especially in remote areas. U.S. government employees may not drive from the U.S.-Mexico border to or from the interior parts of Mexico, except daytime travel within Baja California and between Nogales and Hermosillo on Mexican Federal Highway 15D, and between Nuevo Laredo and Monterrey on Highway 85D.

Criteria for Program Evaluation



- Educational Value Will provide significant contribution to learning at program, institutional, or community levels.
- 2. <u>Program Leadership</u> Adequate number of program leads, sufficient content expertise, and adequate program preparation.
- 3. <u>Appropriateness of Site/Location</u> Appropriate for learning needs, diversity of program offerings, and program safety.
- 4. <u>Adequate Planning</u> Appropriate budget, itinerary, logistics, and other program details.
- 5. <u>Risk Management</u> Adequate attention to health and safety of program participants.
- 6. <u>Strategic/Institutional Value</u> Promotes/Strengthens institutional goals or strategic partnerships.
- 7. <u>Assessment of Learning Outcomes and Institutional Goals</u> Adequate plan to assess, record, and share program outcomes.





Poland


- Animal health observations and site visits
